

MINUTES OF COUNCIL

A regular session of Troy City Council was held on Monday, May 1, 2023 at 7:00 p.m. in Council Chambers, City Hall.

INVOCATION & PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE: An invocation was given by Council Member Pierce followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

RECOGNITION: The outgoing members of the Mayor's Youth Council were recognized.

PUBLIC HEARING: At 7:07 p.m., Council President Lutz declared open a public hearing on Ordinance No. O-21-2023, the rezoning of 15 S. Oxford Street from B-2 to OR-1. There were no comments in this regard and at 7:08 p.m., Council President Lutz declared this public hearing closed.

MINUTES: The Clerk gave a summary of the minutes of the April 17, 2023, meeting of Troy City Council. There were no corrections or additions to these minutes. Upon motion of Mr. Phillips, seconded by Mr. Rozell, these minutes were approved by unanimous roll call vote.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Community & Economic Development Committee: Mr. Schilling, Chairman, reported that Committee supports the recommendation of the Troy Planning Commission and recommends that legislation be prepared to vacate a 0.0408 acre parcel of Right-of-Way at the corner of W. Main Street and S. Stanfield Road as requested by Chick-fil-A. Report submitted by Pierce, Snee and Schilling.

Community Partnerships Committee: Mr. Rozell, Chairman, reported that Committee recommends legislation be prepared authorizing the Director of Public Service and Safety to enter into an agreement with the Troy Area Chamber of Commerce for the 2023 Troy Strawberry Festival to be held June 2, 3 and 4, and to authorize the temporary activation of part of the DORA Temporary Activation Boundary. Committee supports emergency legislation so that the Chamber of Commerce can submit the temporary liquor permit application. Report submitted by Schilling, Severt and Rozell.

Finance Committee: Mr. Severt, Chairman, reported that Committee recommends legislation be prepared accepting the recommendation of the Loan Review Committee to approve a CDBG ED RLF loan to A. M. Scott Distillery, LLC in the amount of \$300,000 to be used to purchase equipment for a new business at 9 W. Main Street and to authorize the Director of Public Service and Safety to submit an application to the Ohio Department of Development, Office of Community Development, for funding for said loan. Committee supports emergency legislation so that the funding application can be submitted and the loan closed without delay. Report submitted by Phillips, Rozell and Severt.

Law & Ordinance Committee: Mrs. Snee, Chairman, reported that Committee concurs that the TRES application of Aldi Inc. Ohio would be an economic development project with the creation of 18 new jobs, and recommends that a letter of support be submitted by the Director of Public Service and Safety for the C-1 and C-2 TRES liquor permit application as requested by Aldi Inc. Ohio for their new location at 50 Troy Town Drive, Troy, Ohio. As this is not a matter of legislation, this Committee asks that this recommendation to support the TRES application be accepted by Council so that a letter can be provided to be included in the application that the applicant will submit to the Division of Liquor Control. Report submitted by Phillips, Severt and Snee.

Motion: A motion was made by Mrs. Snee, seconded by Mr. Twiss, that Council accepts the Law & Ordinance Committee Report regarding the C1 and C2 TRES application of Aldi Inc. Ohio for the location at 50 Troy Town Drive. Motion passed by unanimous roll call vote

Recreation & Parks Committee: Mr. Whidden, Chairman, reported that Committee recommends legislation be prepared authorizing the Community Improvement Corporation of Troy, Ohio to act on behalf of the City to execute a Building Lease and Ground Lease with Busted Brick Realty Group, Inc. related to the construction of public restrooms, and to further authorize the transfer of \$150,050 to the Community Improvement Corporation of Troy, Ohio, for funding related to the construction of the public restrooms. Committee supports emergency legislation so

that documents can be executed and the project commence, subject to the CIC being agreeable to the arrangements.

Report submitted by Rozell, Schilling and Whidden.

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Discussion. Mr. Titterington commented that the Community Improvement Corporation did meet and did agree to be a party to the Building Lease and Ground Lease with Busted Brick Realty Group, Inc., subject to Council approval of the lease documents.
