SUBJECT: AMENDMENT AND EXTENSION - GENERATION AND TRANSMISSION SUPPLY AGREEMENT FOR CITY ACCOUNTS

RECOMMENDATION:

That Council authorizes the Director of Public Service and Safety to sign an amendment to the electric generation supply agreement for City accounts, which will extend the current low rates for a new term through December 31, 2026.

BACKGROUND:

Since 2011, Troy has been one of approximately 20 communities/municipal organizations that participate in a regional purchasing group for electric generation and transmission supply services for municipal facilities that is coordinated and handled by the Miami Valley Communications Council (MVCC). The current agreement is through the term of May 31, 2024, and is based on a very low per kilowatt hour rate. The group's consultant has recommended extending the current contract through December 31, 2026. In order to take advantage of a rate lower than is available on the open market and benefit from the associated savings with that rate. The current rate under this program is \$0.04387 / kWh; the renewal rate is estimated at \$0.05995 / kWh; and the current AES standard service offer rate is \$0.109017 / kWh. That standard service offer rate will be adjusted June 1, 2024 to \$0.1080709 / kWh, which would still be higher than the MVCC renewal rate. MVCC has contacted the entities asking for an indication if each is willing to remain a part of the group and extend the contract.

REQUESTED ACTION:

It would be appreciated if you would assign to a Committee of Council consideration of recommending legislation that would continue to authorize MVCC to extend the current agreement for electric generation and transmission supply through December 31, 2026. Consideration of emergency legislation is requested so that it can be determined if all entities will remain in the group and to confirm the extension.

SUBJECT: SALARY ORDINANCE ADJUSTMENT FOR SEASONAL AND PART-TIME WORKERS

RECOMMENDATION:

That Council considers amending the hourly rate paid to seasonal, part-time and temporary positions to reflect the January 1, 2024 adjustment in the Ohio minimum wage rate, and adjusting the range for intern positions.

BACKGROUND:

The State's new minimum wage rate for 2024 has been set at \$10.45 per hour, a thirty-five cent increase from the current \$10.10 per hour. The Federal minimum wage remains at \$7.25 per hour, but the City is required to follow the Ohio guidelines since that wage rate is greater than the Federal wage. The minimum wage increase impacts the salary ordinance for various seasonal and part-time positions.

Based on a survey related to the wage range for interns, staff is recommending that range be adjusted to be more reflective of the rates paid by neighboring (and competing) communities for the position. The survey results are attached.

Attached is a listing that reflects the current and proposed hourly rates for various seasonal and part-time positions.

REQUESTED ACTION:

It would be appreciated if you would assign to a Committee of Council amending the hourly rate paid to various seasonal, part-time, and temporary positions to be effective January 1, 2024 based on the attached.

SUBJECT: REPORT OF THE PLANNING COMMISSION: PETITION FOR VACATION OF ALLEY BETWEEN 901 W. WATER STREET & 824-830 WASHINGTON ROAD

On November 8, 2023, the Troy Planning Commission considered the petition for the vacation of a 12' wide alley of record between 901 W. Water St. (Part Inlot 388) and 824 Washington St. (Part Inlot 589) and 830 Washington St (Part Inlot 589). The City does not have buried infrastructure of water and sanitary sewer within the area requested to be vacated. It is not known if other utilities, such as cable, phone, electric or gas, may exist within the area requested to be vacated. All easements shall remain in accordance with Chapter 723.041 of the Ohio Revised Code.

The existing right-of-way is currently unimproved and not utilized by the City. A house located at 901 W. Water St. partially sits in the existing right-of-way. By vacating the alley, the property owner plans to remedy the house encroachments that currently exists. Vacating the right-of-way will not adversely impact any of the neighbors. City staff recommended approval of the vacation petition.

By unanimous vote, the Troy Planning Commission is recommending to Troy City Council approval of the petition to vacate of a 12' wide alley of record between 901 W. Water St. (Part Inlot 388) and 824 Washington St. (Part Inlot 589) and 830 Washington St (Part Inlot 589).

The recommendation of the Troy Planning Commission is forwarded for consideration of Troy City Council.

**Alley located north of Water Street, between Inlot 388 (901 W. Water St.) & Inlot 589
comprised of 824 Washington Street and 830 Washington Street**

We, the undersigned abutting property owners, hereby petition the City of Troy, Ohio to vacate the following:

An alley along the north side of Part Inlot 388 (901 W. Water Street.), and the south side of Inlot 589 (824 Washington Street and 830 Washington Street). The portion of alley to be vacated is 53.22 feet in length and approximately 10 feet wide. The land that makes up the 10 foot wide alley will become part of Inlot 388 (901 W. Water Street.)

We understand that if the petition is approved, the alley will become part of Inlot 388 (901 W. Water Street.) and the owner of Inlot 388 will become responsible for the maintenance.
