Message from the Chief:

Several positive changes occurred in 2025. The transfer of property room and accreditation duties from a sworn officer to a newly created civilian position increased the number of officers available for enforcement operations. Combined with improved staffing levels and the implementation of a 12-hour patrol schedule, this resulted in more officers on patrol, the creation of a fourth detective position, and a reduction in overtime required to meet minimum staffing levels.

Operationally, pursuits decreased by 55%, and uses of force decreased by 50%. Four additional Flock cameras were installed, bringing the total to 13. These cameras were used in more than 179 investigations and have become an important investigative tool. They assist in identifying vehicles involved in crashes where suspects flee the scene, locating theft suspects when only a vehicle description is available, recovering stolen vehicles, finding missing persons, and supporting many other investigations.

One of our detectives attended the U.S. Secret Service's Forensic Mobile Device Examiner training at no cost to the City. Developing the ability to extract digital evidence in-house is critical in today's environment and will improve the efficiency and timeliness of investigations. We also revised procedures for assigning, monitoring, and closing open investigations to improve the accuracy and timeliness of crime reporting to state and federal databases.

Reported crime decreased slightly, from 1,325 incidents in 2024 to 1,307 in 2025. Major crime categories included two homicides, compared to none in 2024. One of which was a murder-suicide involving a married couple in their 60's, the other a vehicular homicide. Other statistics include: rape (no change), aggravated assault (+40%), robbery (-25%), arson (no change), burglary/breaking & entering (-54%), motor vehicle theft (-60%), and larceny/theft (-15%). Additional details regarding crime statistics are provided in this annual report.

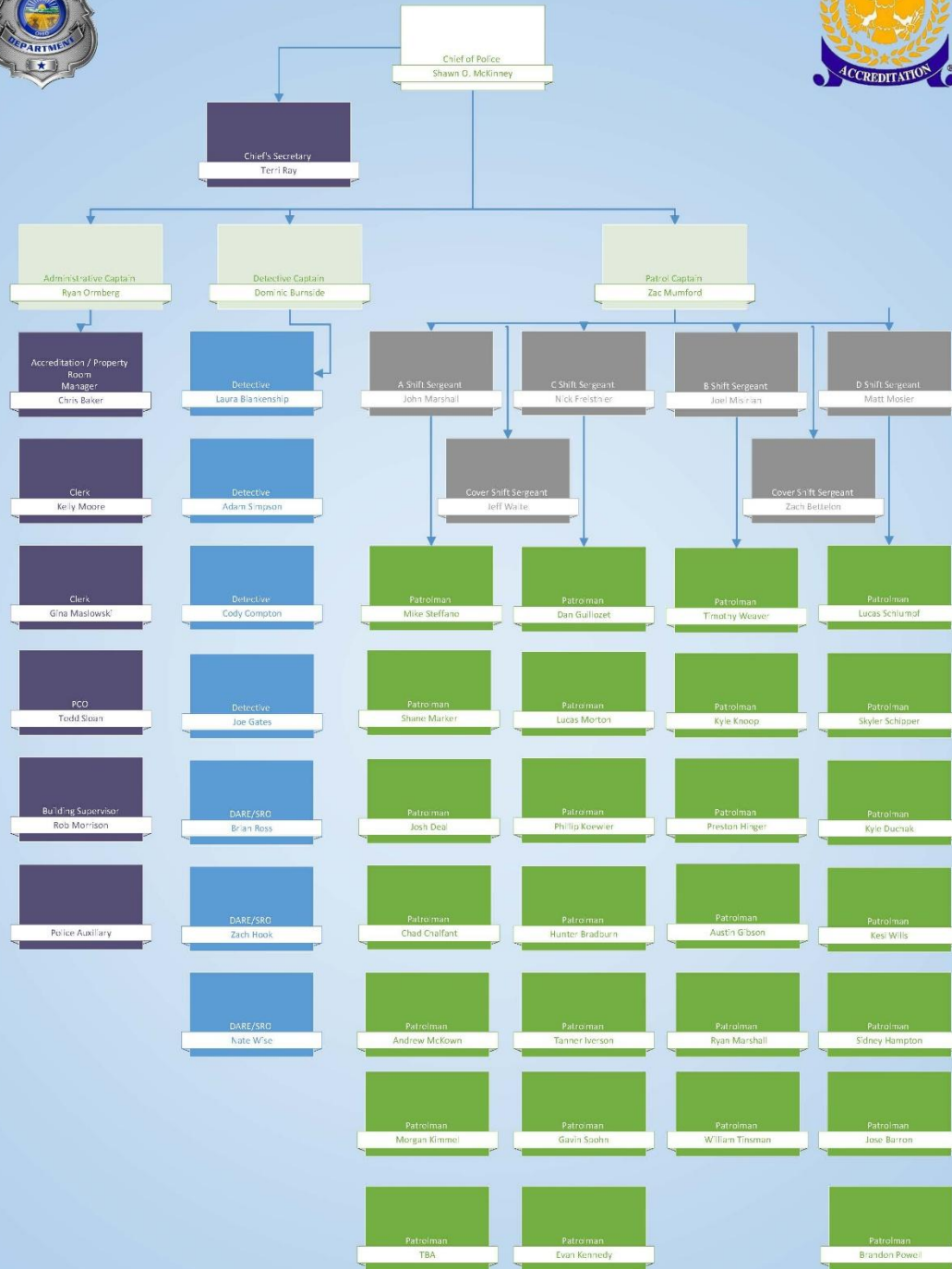
Police Chiefs

The first Town Marshall was John Putterbaugh, elected by Council in 1830. A Town Marshall would continue to be elected by the Troy Council until 1874. Starting in 1874, the Town Marshall was elected to a two-year term by popular vote until 1900. In 1900, George Irwin was appointed the first Chief of Police after serving as Town Marshall since 1884.

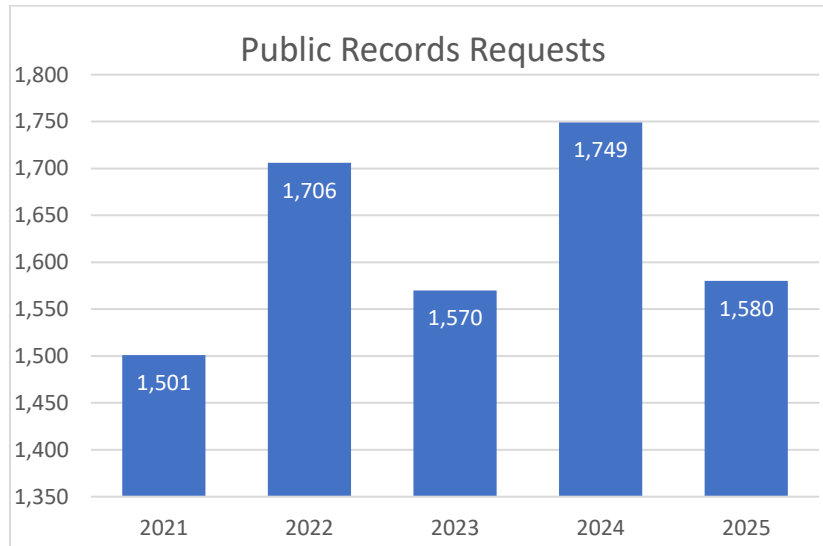
Troy Police Department Organizational Chart

Administration Section

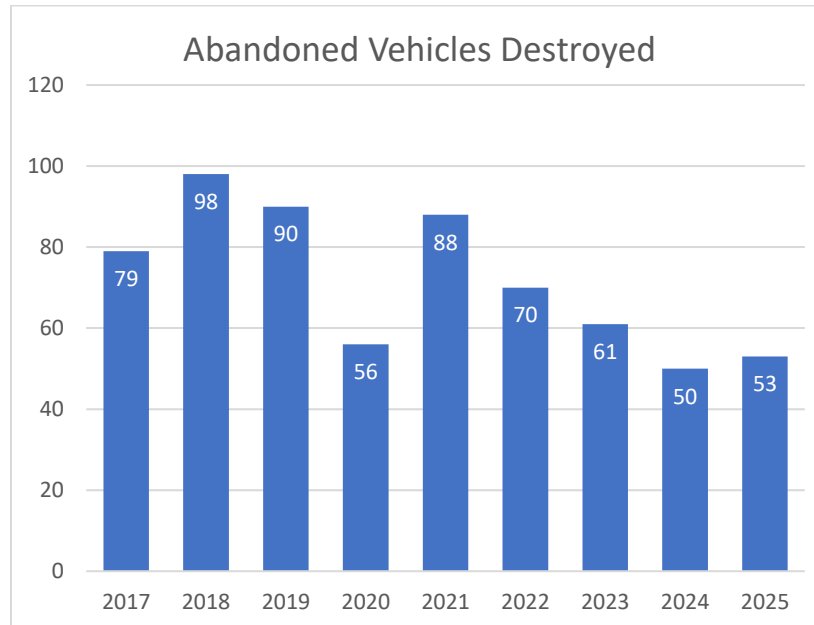
The Administrative Section was commanded by Captain Ryan Ormberg. Its primary responsibilities include records management, parking control, hiring, accreditation, and building maintenance.



In 2025, the Records Section processed 1,580 public records requests. These ranged from simple report copies to time-intensive body camera video redactions. On average, every hour of video released requires approximately three hours of labor to properly review and redact. Requests for video footage declined in 2025, particularly from individuals who appeared to be monetizing videos on social media. This decrease followed the State's passage of legislation allowing jurisdictions to charge fees for video record requests. The City updated its Public Records Policy, and the new fee structure became effective on April 9, 2025.

The Record's Section is responsible for several other duties, including several permits, inspections, grants, and the QRT team. Vendor's (door-to-door sales) permits and food truck permits are processed by the Records Section and approved by the Chief of Police. The Police Department conducts local record checks, and a \$25 application fee is required. In 2025, there were 44 vendor's license applications, 1 was denied, for a total income of \$1,100. Twenty-four (24) food truck applications were received of which all were approved for a total of \$600 collected in application fees.

The parking control officer conducts low-speed vehicle inspections. Fifteen (15) slow-moving vehicles were inspected in 2025 for a total income of \$300.



In 2025, the Department disposed of 53 abandoned vehicles. This process is time-consuming and generates significant postage costs, which totaled \$565 for the year.

The Administrative Section oversees two grant-funded reimbursement programs. The first provides federal and state reimbursement for ballistic vests. In accordance with contract requirements and manufacturer recommendations, officers receive new vests every five years. In 2025, the Department received \$3,828 in reimbursement under this program.

The second program is the Quick Response Team (QRT), established in 2016. The team includes an addiction counselor, firefighter, and police officer who attempt to contact overdose survivors and others who may benefit from addiction recovery services within the City of Troy. Costs associated with the team are reimbursed through the State Drug Abuse Response Team (DART) grant administered by the Ohio Attorney General's Office. The Administrative Section manages the grant application

and extensive reporting requirements. In 2025, \$18,787 in program costs were reimbursed.

Officers and the Parking Control Officer issued 299 parking citations citywide, along with 166 written warnings. Fines paid directly to the Police Department totaled \$6,660 in 2025, compared to \$13,150 in 2024—a 49% decrease. Unpaid citations are filed in Municipal Court.

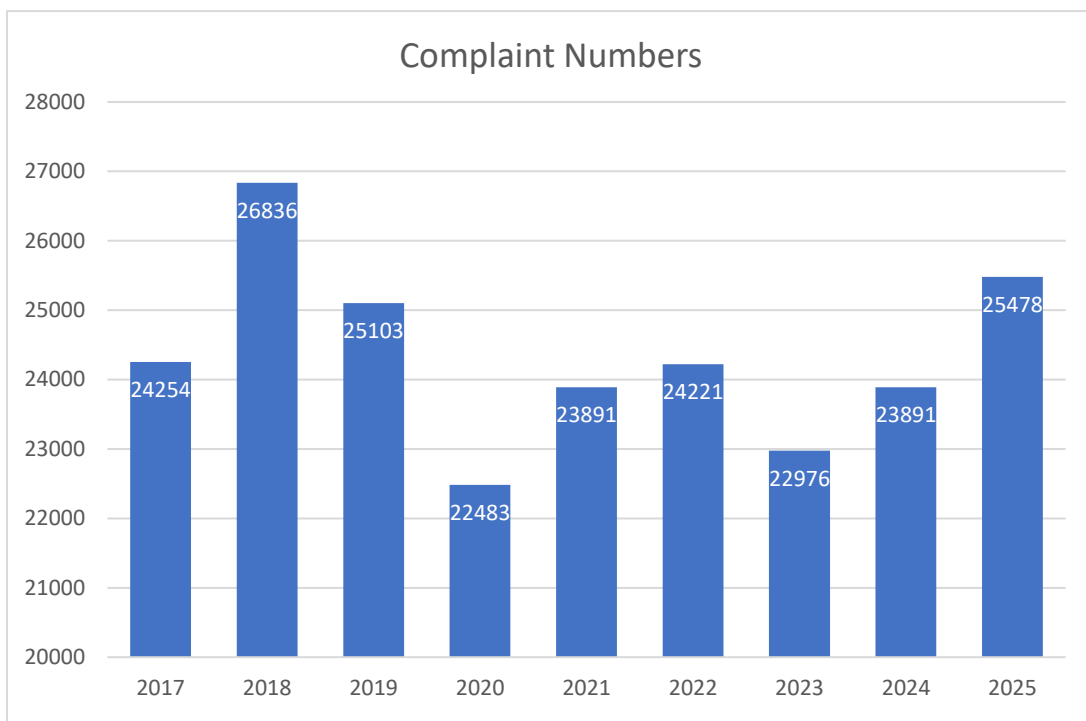
Major building projects in 2025 included the replacement of the building's original fire alarm system, which became inoperable in late 2024. Because replacement parts were no longer available, a complete system replacement was required. The Administrative Section also led a comprehensive assessment of the facility's needs. The assessment determined that remodeling the basement and first floor, along with replacing the building's windows, would improve energy efficiency, enhance space utilization, and update significantly worn areas.

Additionally, Captain Ormberg organized a full-scale active shooter exercise along with the Miami County Emergency Management Agency, Fire Department, and City staff. The exercise, which was the City's largest since 2007, utilized patrol officers, detectives, the Tactical Response Team, and the command-and-control function from both the police department and other City departments.

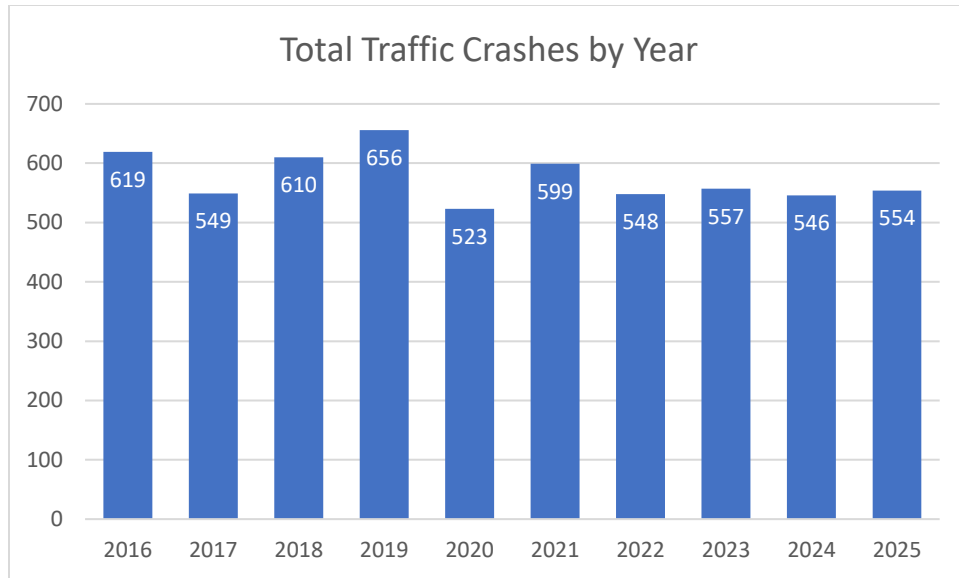
Patrol Section

In 2025, the Patrol Section was led by Captain Zac Mumford. Reporting to him were six sergeants and 27 patrol officers.

A 12-hour patrol schedule, proposed by the Troy Police Officers' Association, was approved by the City as a one-year trial. After evaluating the program and identifying multiple benefits, and at the Association's request, the schedule will continue into 2026. Overall, the new schedule has been viewed as a success.



One measure of Patrol activity is the number of complaint numbers generated annually, typically as a result of calls for service. In 2025, officers recorded 25,478 complaint numbers—an increase of 1,587 from 2024, representing a 7% rise.

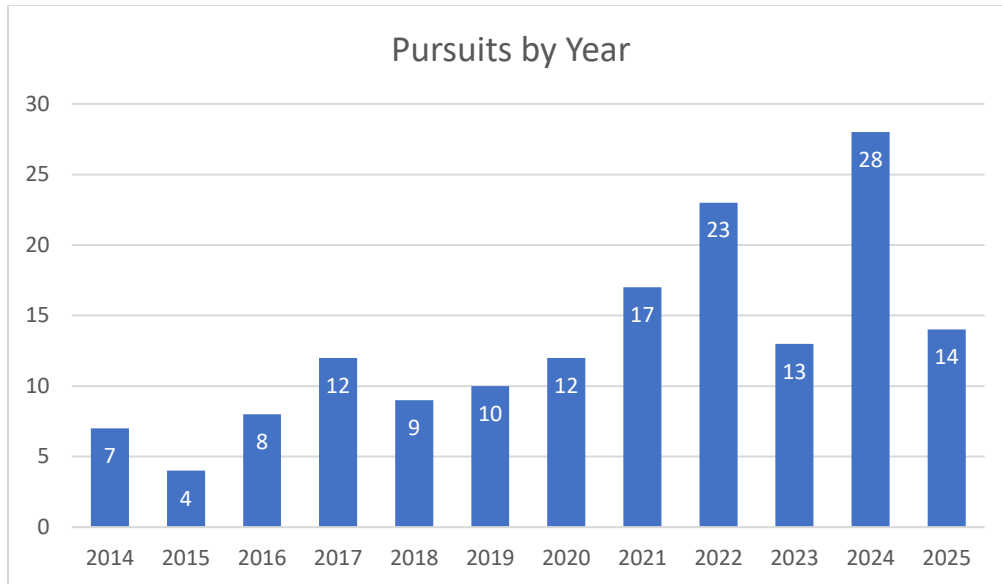


A primary responsibility of the Patrol Section is investigating traffic crashes and enforcing traffic laws to enhance roadway safety. In 2025, 554 traffic crash reports were completed within the city limits, a slight 1.5% increase from the previous year. The top three crash locations were:

- **W. Main St./S. Stanfield Rd.** – 32 crashes (previously ranked 4th with 20 crashes)
- **W. Main St/Troy Town Dr.** – 16 crashes (previously unranked among top locations)
- **McKaig Ave./S. Dorset Rd.** – 14 crashes (previously unranked among top locations)

Officers conducted **7,063 traffic stops** in 2025, a 35% increase from 2024, and issued **2,020 traffic citations** and **6,160 warnings**.

In 2025, there were 19 OVI-related crashes, the same amount as the previous year.



Vehicle pursuits **decreased by 50%** compared to 2024. The annual pursuit review completed by the Patrol Captain documents each of the **14 reported pursuits**. It may be more accurate to state that this report details any time a motorist failed to comply with the lawful order of an officer to stop. In two (2) cases, we assisted other agencies without engaging in a pursuit, and in eight (8) cases, the officer pursued less than a mile or not at all. Officers terminated 6 of the 14 pursuits.

Additional pursuit-related data includes:

- Tire deflation devices were deployed five times, with three successful deployments.
- The PIT maneuver was used three times.
- Two crashes occurred, with no injuries reported.
- Of the 11 known or suspected offenders, three were Troy residents, one was a juvenile, and four were believed to be under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

Investigative Section

In 2025, the Investigative Section was led by Captain Dominic Burnside. The section consisted of four detectives and oversaw the School Resource Officer (SRO) program. One SRO was assigned to the six elementary schools, one to the junior high school, and one to the high school.

During the summer, the section organized Safety Town and Crime Scene Camp. Through a grant from the Troy Foundation, Safety Town equipment, including the tarp and miniature buildings, was updated; however, the new tarp did not arrive in time for the 2025 session. Due to declining participation in the police-sponsored bicycle camp over the past several years, the program was replaced with a new initiative, *Get Hooked on Fishing*. This free camp was held in partnership with the Miami County Sheriff's Office and the Park District, with private donations from local businesses. The camp filled quickly and was considered a success.

SRO's also participated in several community events, including National Night Out Against Crime, Career Day at the County Fairgrounds for junior high students, and Trunk or Treat with Children's Services.

In March, a fourth detective position was added. This expansion was made possible by improved staffing levels and was necessary to address an increased investigative workload.

Detective Adam Simpson attended the U.S. Secret Service's Forensic Mobile Device Examiner training at no cost to the City. The Department also received equipment, software, and a one-year software license. This capability allows the Department to extract and analyze evidence from mobile phones internally, rather than relying on outside agencies. Given the volume of information stored on electronic devices, this capability is critical to conducting timely and thorough investigations. By agreeing to examine devices for other agencies, the Department remains eligible for continued funding from the Secret Service to cover software licensing costs and

strengthens interagency cooperation. Detective Simpson conducted 31 examinations for Troy cases and 25 for other jurisdictions.

In addition to supporting the Patrol Section on numerous cases, detectives were assigned 177 high-profile and complex investigations in 2025. SROs handled 98 cases and school-related calls for service, the majority originating from the high school. The section also conducted active shooter training at three schools, including a large-scale exercise involving all Troy City Schools staff. Additional training included one active shooter presentation for a local business and three robbery response trainings for financial institutions.

Throughout the year, the Investigative Section continued its close partnership with the Child Advocacy Center (CAC) in Troy. Detectives collaborated with the multidisciplinary team on 24 cases involving children who were victims of crimes or witnesses to violence.

Summary of Major Cases:

- **Warrant (25TR01901)** - On January 29, 2025, patrol officers attempted to serve an arrest warrant on Mr. Daoto Thomas at 1445 McKaig Avenue. The suspect threatened officers and refused to surrender. After several hours of negotiations, and as members of the Troy Tactical Response Team prepared to enter the residence, Mr. Thomas exited the apartment and was taken into custody without incident.
- **Assault on Officers (25TR02045)** – On January 31, 2025, patrol officers responded to Walgreens on a report of a man, believed to be under the influence of drugs, breaking car windows with a metal pole. During the incident, the suspect struck one officer in the head with the pole. A second officer was struck in the forearm while deflecting another swing intended for the first officer's head.
 - Dustin Taylor (36) was sentenced to 5 to 7 ½ years in prison.
- **House Fire (25TR02341)** – On February 5, 2025, officers were dispatched to a house fire at 27 Westbrook Lane. At great personal risk, Officer Shane Marker and Officer Michael Steffano rescued a severely injured victim who was confined to a wheelchair and removed her from the home. Officers immediately provided first aid; however, despite their efforts, the victim did not survive her injuries.
- **Fatal Crash (25TR03399)** – On February 21, 2025, a vehicle crossed left of center on Adams Street near Hobart Arena and struck an oncoming vehicle head-on. A 55-year-old female passenger seated in the rear of the vehicle was killed.
 - Dennis Grothouse (73) pleaded guilty to vehicular manslaughter and was fined \$850.
- **Felonious Assault (25TR04147)** – On March 4, 2025, officers responded to a reported stabbing at 1165 Stephenson Drive.

Alexander Greene (23) stabbed his 31-year-old cousin during the incident.

- Greene was sentenced to 4 years in prison.

- **Pursuit (25TR06748)** – On April 13, 2025, a patrol sergeant attempted to stop a vehicle for multiple traffic violations on North Market Street. The driver, who appeared to be intoxicated, failed to stop. PIT maneuvers were attempted several times in the area of West Main Street and Dorset Road. During the pursuit, the driver rammed multiple police vehicles and was ultimately stopped after being deployed with a Taser. Total damage to police vehicles was \$15,182.
 - Colin Langdon (33) pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 4½ to 6 years in prison, an 8-year license suspension, a \$565 fine, and paid restitution for the damage to the police vehicles.
- **Murder/Suicide (25TR07157)** – On April 18, 2025, officers responded to 1405 Croydon Road to conduct a welfare check. After forcing entry into the residence, officers located a 60-year-old woman and her 67-year-old husband deceased from an apparent murder-suicide.

Training

Highlights of training this year.

- *Every officer attended 24 hours of State-mandated Continuing Professional Training (CPT), which included a 2-hour report writing course taught by the Chief, and an in-house driving/pursuit course taught by Troy PD driving instructors*
- *One in-service training day that included Taser and other less-than-lethal weapons.*

- *The Chief and one captain attended the Ohio Association of Chiefs of Police annual conference.*
- *The Chief and one captain attended a FEMA Event Security Planning course.*
- *The Chief, 2 captains, and 3 sergeants attended MVRMA's legal update class*
- *The Chief, a captain, and a detective attended the Fraternal Order of Police's course on officer-involved shootings.*
- *The Chief, captains, and sergeants attended Police Action Death training taught by Ohio BCI.*
- *One Captain attended OPOTA Instructor school*
- *One captain and one detective attended a narcotics investigation course*
- *Two sergeants attended ICAT instructor course (de-escalation).*
- *Two sergeants attended a critical incident leadership course.*
- *One sergeant attended a drone course*
- *A detective attended training sponsored by the Secret Service to become a certified mobile (digital) device analyst.*
- *One detective attended interview and interrogation training*
- *Two senior officers attended a basic supervision course.*
- *Six officers attended a course on Asphyxiation/Strangulation*
- *Six (6) officers attended Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement (ARIDE)*
- *Six (6) officers attended the Tri-County Board of Recovery and Mental Health's Crisis Intervention Training*
- *Eight (8) officers attended their initial Precision Immobilization Technique (PIT) training, and Nineteen (19) were recertified through in-service training.*
- *Three officers attending an in-hour Field Training Officer (FTO) course.*
- *One of the Taser instructors was recertified.*
- *One officer attended a cybercrime course*
- *One officer attended Evidence Technician training*

Staffing Levels

Overall staffing levels were more stable and improved in 2025. The average daily vacancy rate was 1.1 officers, compared to 2.6 in 2024.

In 2025, the responsibilities of Property Room and Accreditation Manager were reassigned to a newly created non-sworn position. This change effectively increased the number of sworn officers available for enforcement duties and allowed the addition of a fourth detective position in March. The position was added in response to the Detective Section's workload and has helped improve work-life balance, particularly given detectives' on-call responsibilities.

The Department was fully staffed for one week in 2025. Shortly thereafter, an officer with less than one year of experience resigned. Additionally, one officer and one sergeant retired during the year. Three new officers were hired in 2025.

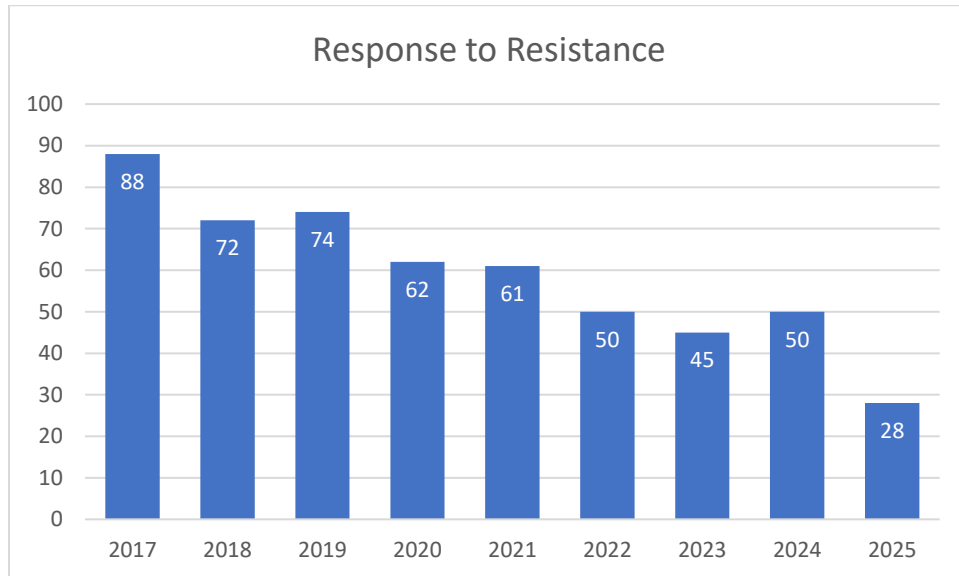
In addition to the reduced vacancy rate, implementation of 12-hour shifts decreased overtime required to meet minimum staffing levels by 65%. However, vacancy figures do not fully reflect staffing challenges. Officers on military deployment, fulfilling other reserve obligations, on injury leave, or a trend to use more accrued paid time off are not always available for assignment. In 2025, one officer was deployed for most of the year. Furthermore, newly hired officers do not count toward minimum staffing levels until they complete their training phase.

If fully staffed, using the City of Troy 2024 population estimate of 27,122, 44 sworn officers, and 5 civilians the ratio of law enforcement employees to 1,000 people is 1.8. As the City continues to grow, consideration should be given to increasing the size of the Department and/or conducting a formal staffing study to maintain the current level of service.

Accreditation

The Troy Police Department maintained its accreditation through the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) and the Ohio Collaborative. In 2025, the Department had an annual web-based review of approximately ¼ of CALEA's standards. The web-based assessment found no standards issues.

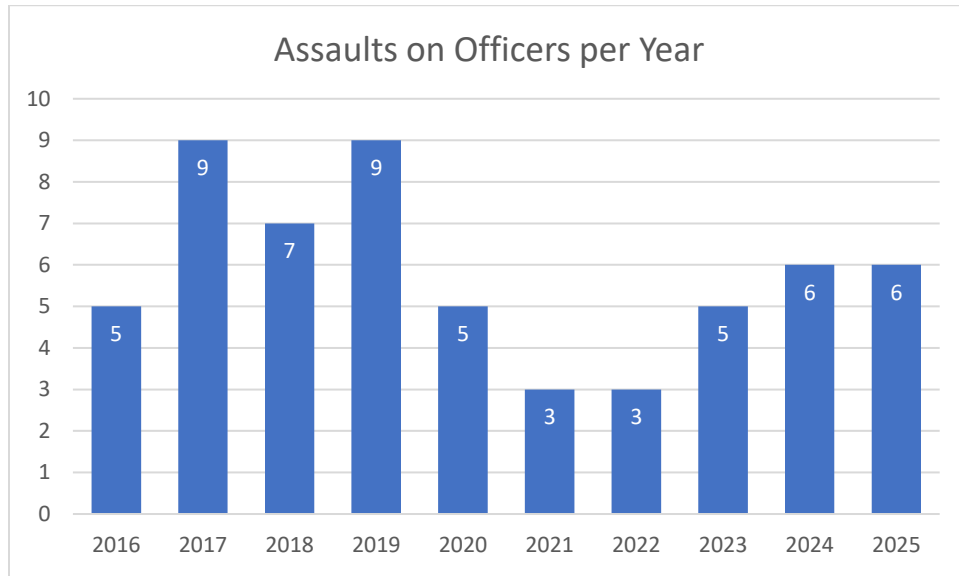
Response to Resistance



The Department tracks and reviews all uses of force internally (Response to Resistance). In 2025, there were 28 use-of-force incidents, 12 of which involved officers only displaying a weapon, their firearm or Taser. This represents a 55% reduction from the previous year and is also well below the average number of incidents recorded between 2017 and 2024 of 63.

There is no single explanation for this year's decrease or the overall trend. Possible factors include a reduction in arrests, cultural changes within the Department, or updates to officer training. All incidents are further analyzed in the annual Use of Force Analysis, which is completed by the Patrol Captain each January.

Assaults on Officers



Six (6) officers were assaulted in 2025, the same amount as in 2024, making the 10-year average of 5.8 officer assaults per year.

The Department further examines assaults on officers, which is completed by the Patrol Captain in January of each year.

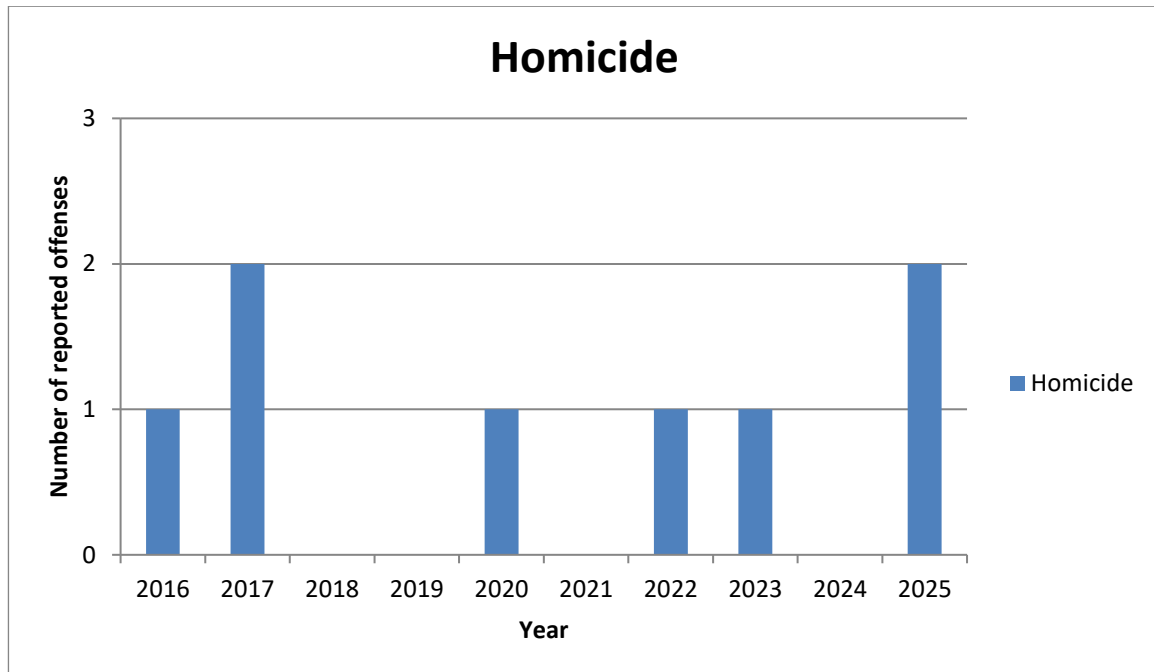

Each City ward, when set up after the 2020 Census, had approximately the same population, 4,400 residents. Set-up errors in our records management system may have slightly affected early 2023 results. The number represents all calls assigned a complaint number within the City to any law enforcement agency within Miami County, except the Ohio State Highway Patrol.

Ward 2 had the highest amount of calls with 5,790, followed by Ward 5, then Ward 4.

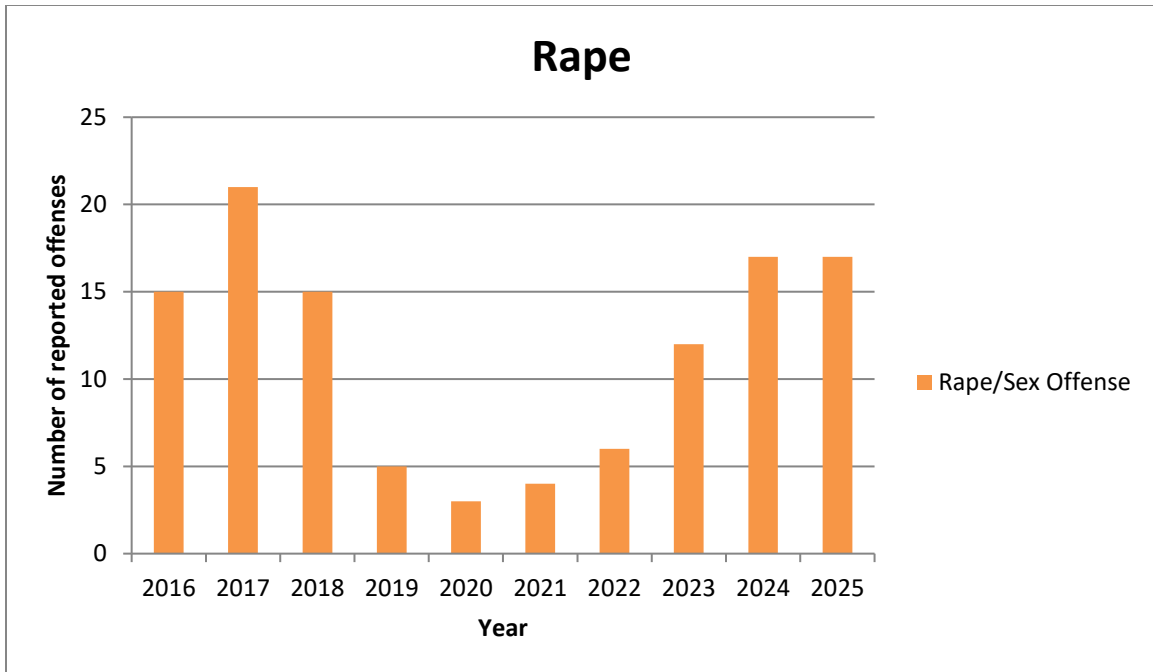
Crime Statistics

Part 1 Crimes



Homicides: There were two reported homicides in Troy in 2025. In the past 10 years, there have been 8 homicides reported in Troy, and all have been cleared.

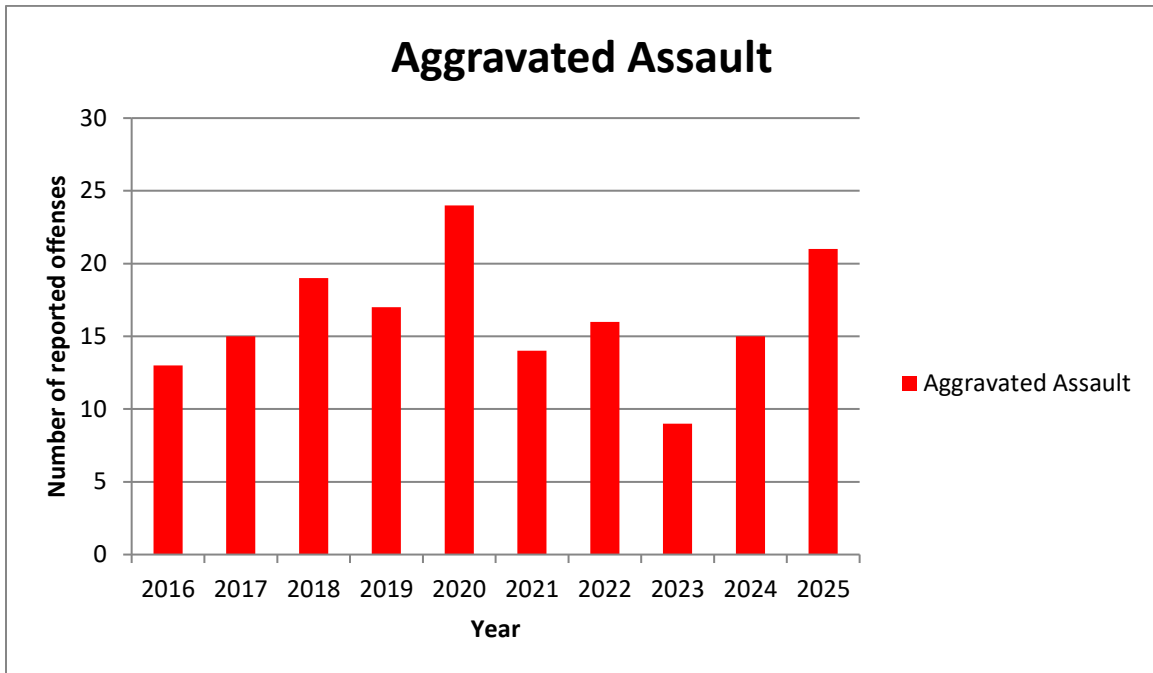
- April 18, 2025, Murder/suicide – husband/wife - victim of the murder, Laurie Neal
- February 21, 2025, Vehicular Manslaughter of Hope Peeples – passenger in at-fault vehicle.
- March 6, 2023, Aggravated Vehicular Homicide of a juvenile
- April 14, 2022, Aggravated Murder of Easton Ho
- December 14, 2020, Involuntary Manslaughter of Nicholas Walker (Overdose/drug dealer was charged)

Rape: There were 17 reported rapes in Troy in 2025. 2024 has been reconciled with those reported to and published by the Ohio Incident-Based Reporting System(OIBRS). Other facts include:

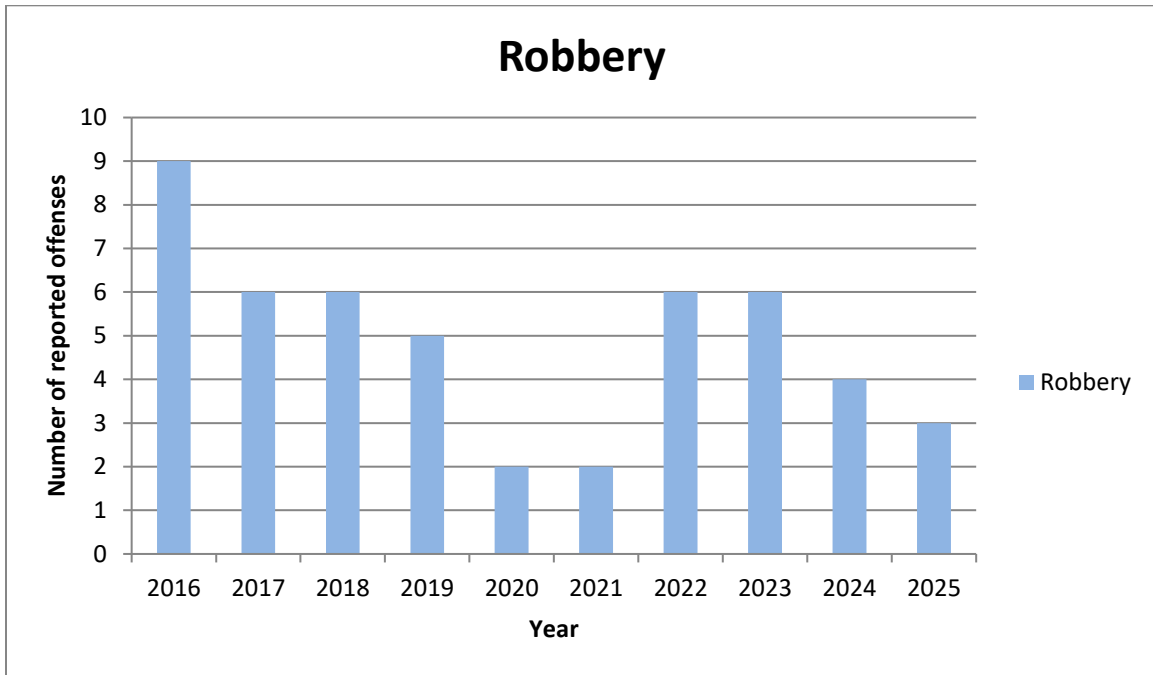
- One (1) case resulted in an arrest for unlawful sexual conduct with a minor
- Four (4) cases are still under investigation
- Six (6) cases were closed without an arrest because the victim requested no prosecution or stopped cooperating after the initial disclosure.
- Six (6) cases were closed without arrest due to lack of evidence or prohibited by case law.
- One (1) adult female reported being a victim in two cases involving the same suspect.
- Ages of the suspect/victim
 - In eight (8) cases, both the suspect and victim were adults
 - In six (6) cases, the suspect was an adult, and the victim a juvenile
 - In two (2) cases, both the suspect and victim were juveniles
 - In one (1) case, the victim was an adult, and the suspect's age is unknown.
- The victims were reported as:
 - 9 – Adult females
 - 7 – Juvenile females
 - 1 – Juvenile males
- The relationship between the victim and suspect was reported as:
 - 13 – Acquaintance, friend, or otherwise known

- 1 – Sibling
- 1 – Spouse
- 1 – Other family member
- 1 – Unknown – victim did not speak to police

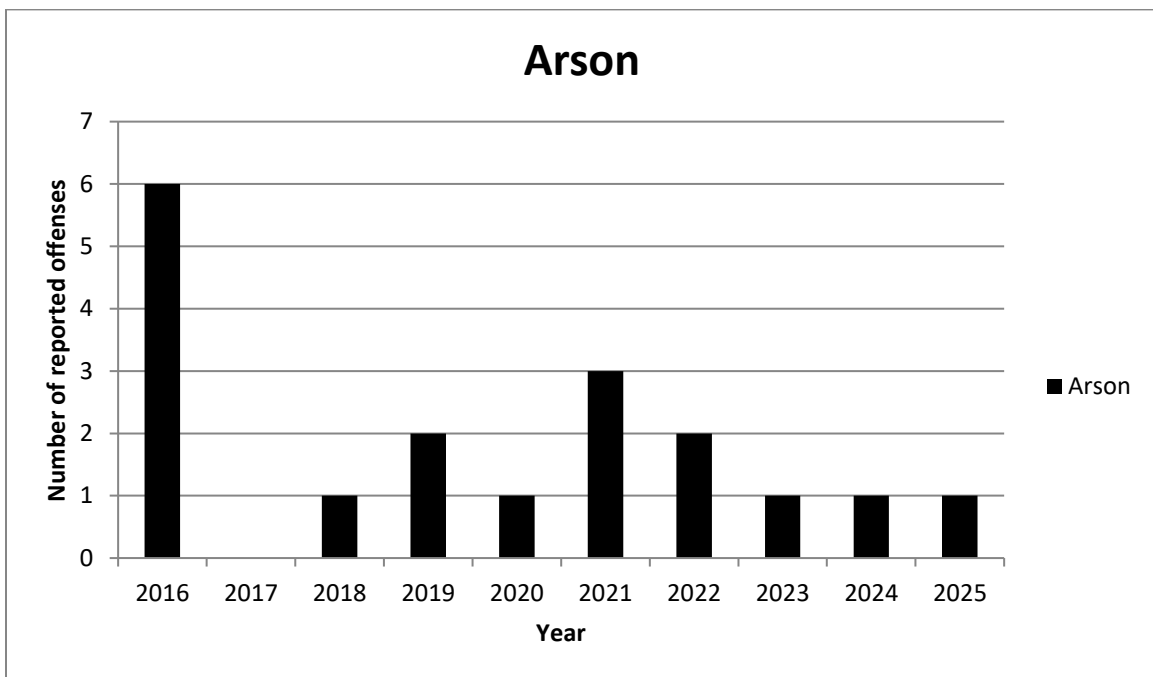


Aggravated Assault: There were 21 reported aggravated assaults in Troy in 2025. Aggravated assaults are defined as those in which serious physical harm is caused, or the victim is threatened or injured with a weapon. All except one were closed by an arrest.

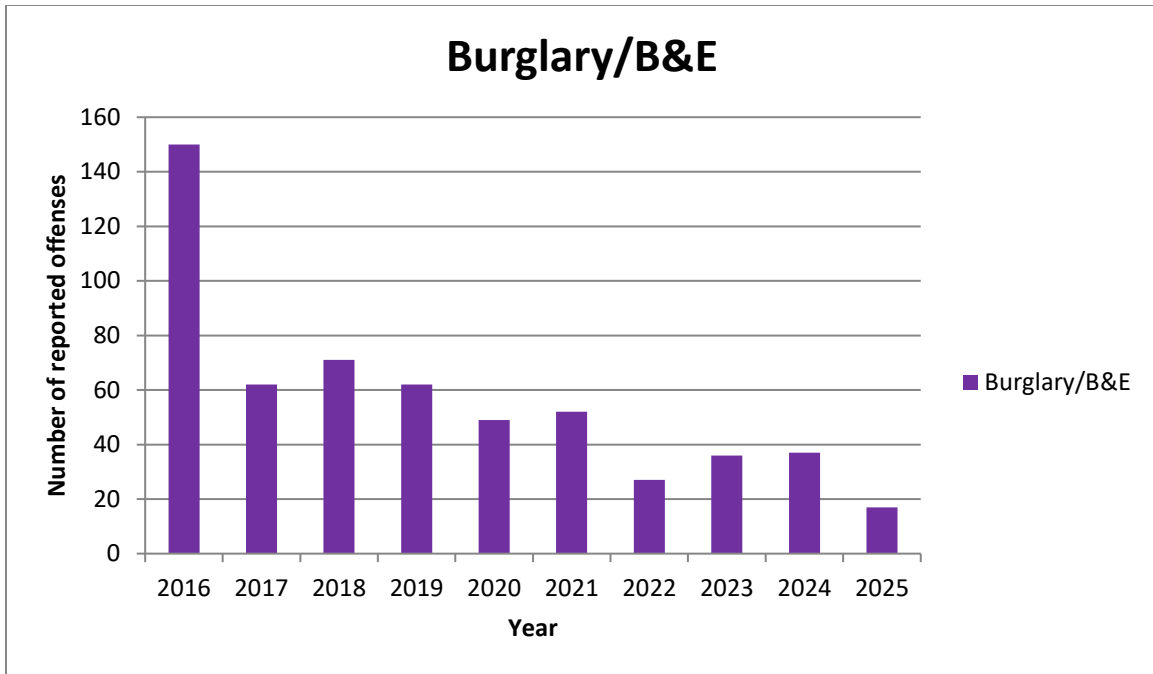
- Six (6) of the cases involved people who were unknown to each other;
 - Four (4) were Troy police officers
 - One (1) was a fast-food employee who was threatened by a customer upset with his order, with a gun
 - One is unsolved case.
- All other aggravated assaults were between people known to each other, which included family members, boyfriend/girlfriend, or otherwise known.
- Two (2) subjects arrested were juveniles.
- The unsolved case where a woman claimed to have been stabbed at an unknown location in Troy and did not recall any details. After the initial call, the victim would not speak to the assigned detective, and the truthfulness of the report was called into question by her boyfriend.



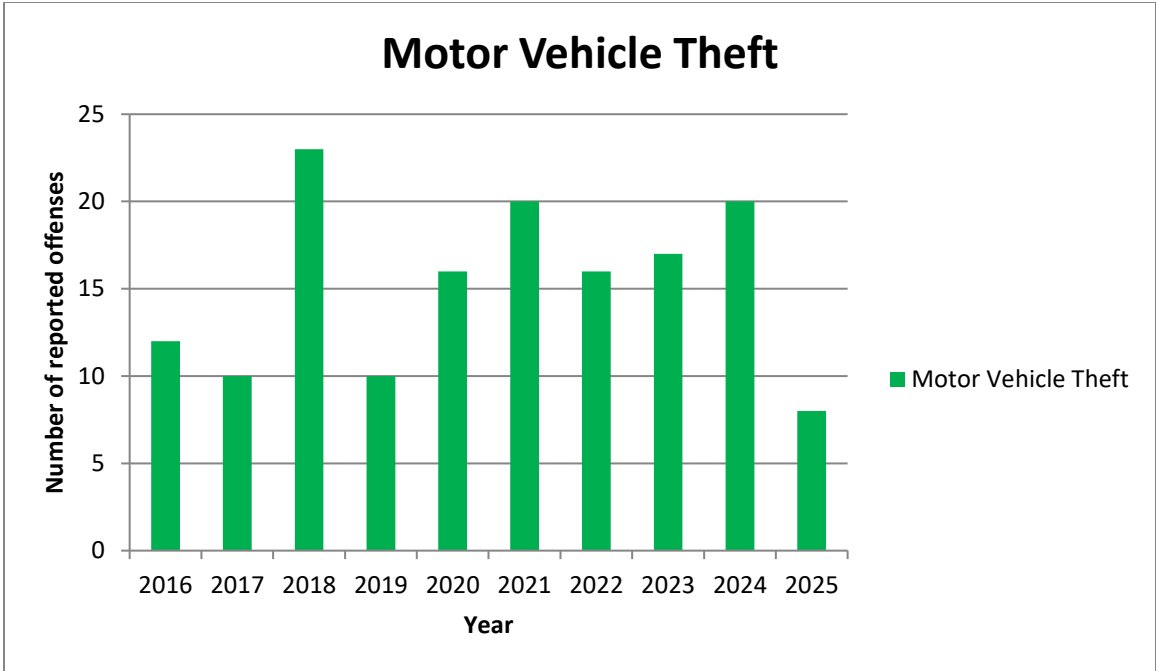
Robbery: There were four (3) reported robberies in Troy in 2025, of which three (2) were cleared by arrest. One (1) was a robbery of businesses (former employee), and two (2) were robberies of individuals. No guns were displayed. The suspect was known to the victim in two cases; the relationship was unknown in the 3rd.



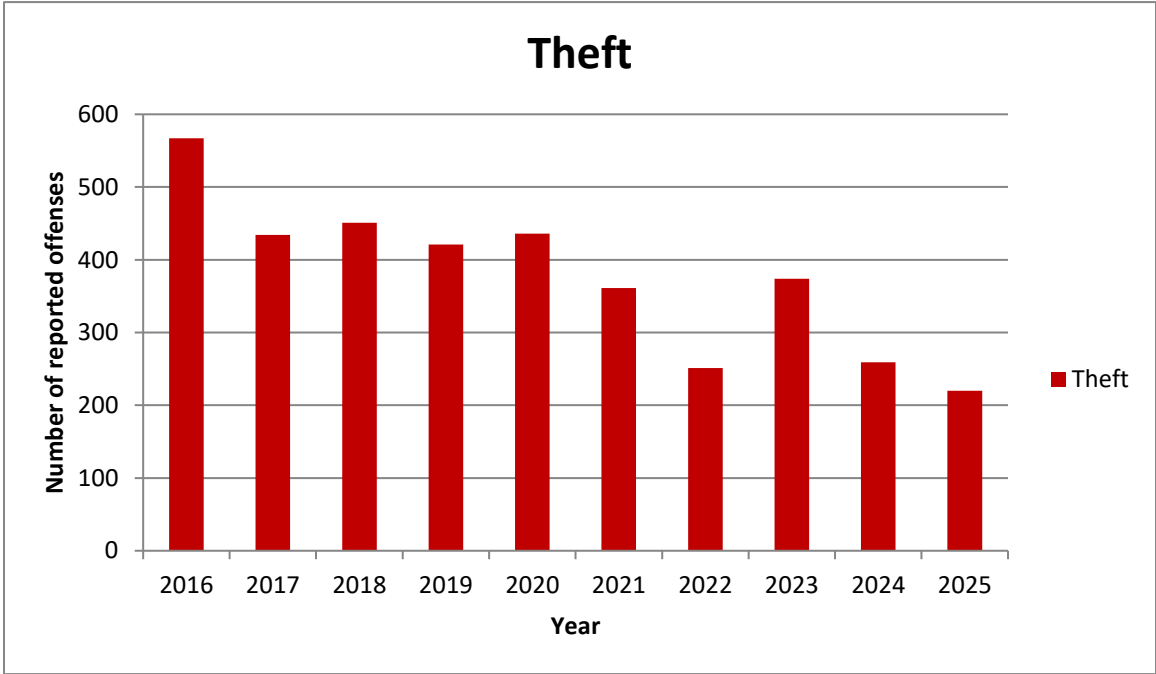
Arson: There was one (1) suspected arson in Troy in 2025. The case involved a dumpster at a business. It was cleared by an arrest.



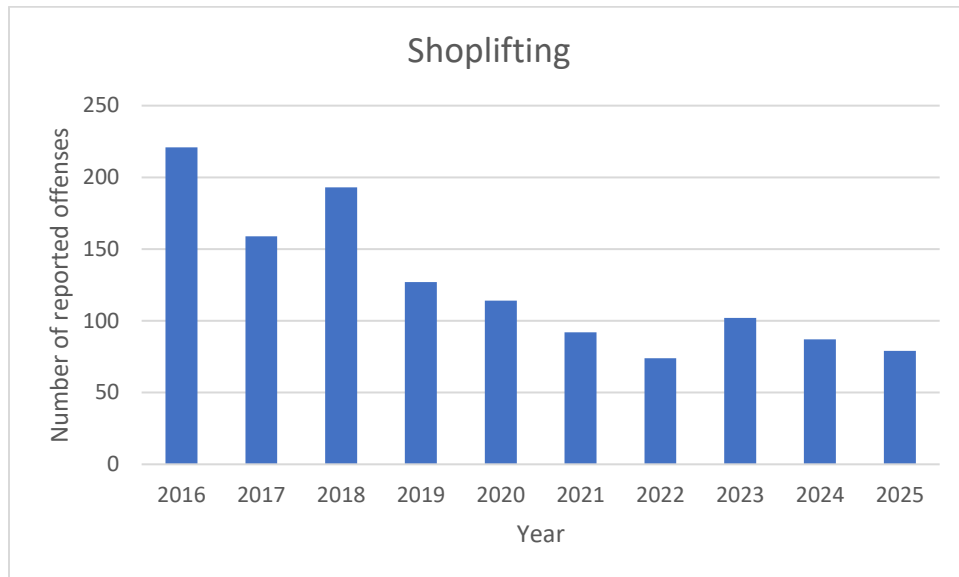
Burglary: There were 17 reported burglaries/B&E's in Troy in 2025. Twelve (12) cases were closed by arrest. The suspect was known to the victim in nine (9) incidents. In one incident, the former tenant was suspected by the landlord, and in two (2) others were rental properties that were supposed to be vacant. Of the four (4) incidents with no suspects, and no one present at the time, two were apartments, one was a living area separate from the main home on a residential property, and the third was camper parked at a rental storage location. One incident involved a large retail store.



Auto Theft: There were eight (8) reported motor vehicle thefts in Troy in 2025. The makes included 2 Hondas, 2 Jeeps, and one each of a Freightliner Semi-truck, Chevrolet, Chrysler, and Toyota.



Theft: There were 220 reported thefts in Troy in 2024.

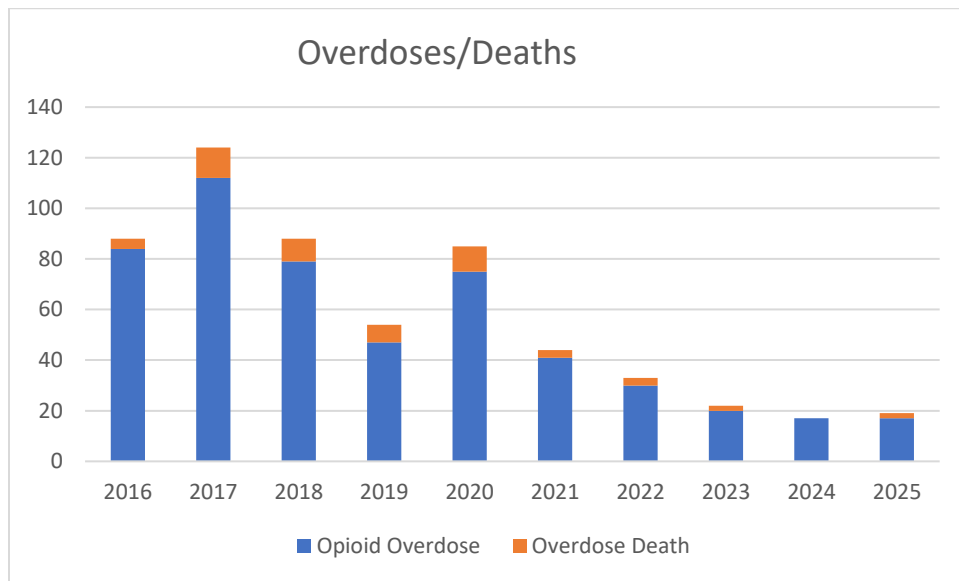


Shopliftings are included in theft reports.

The continued decline in thefts is also reflected in the 79 shoplifting incidents reported in 2025 inside the City. Officers often attribute this decrease to fewer calls by and/or a reduction in loss prevention staff at the City's big-box stores.

The past years' crime statistics are obtained from the Department's RMS. Previous years are reconciled with statistics reported to the State and FBI. The crimes documented above are those that have traditionally been reported as Part 1 Crimes of the FBI's Uniform Crime Report (UCR). FBI crime statistics are usually not released until the fall of the following year.

Opioid Overdoses/Deaths

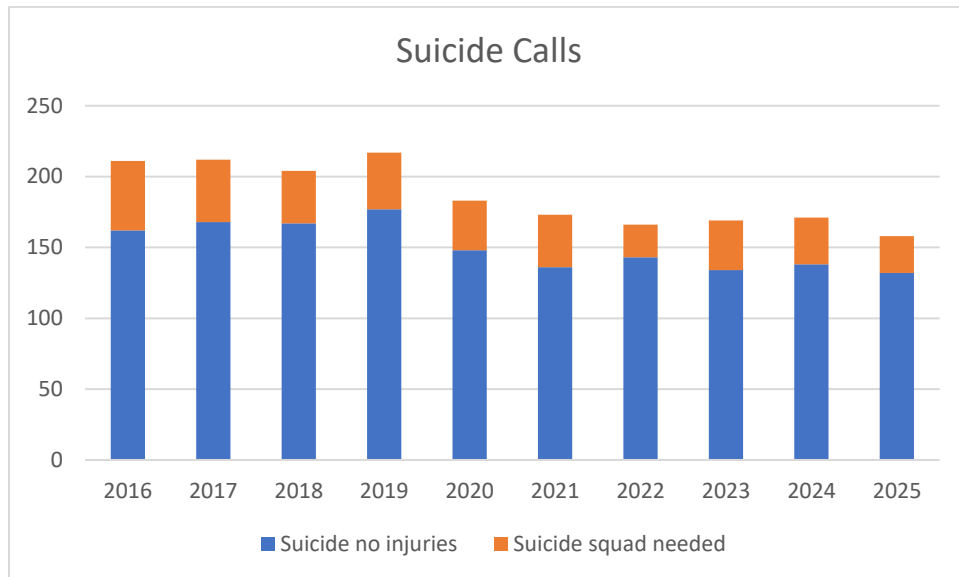


Reported suspected opioid overdoses increased in 2025. The Police Department continued its participation in the Quick Response Team in partnership with the Troy Fire Department and Sunrise Treatment Center to connect individuals who experienced an overdose, or who are suspected of struggling with drug or alcohol addiction, to available resources and treatment options.

In 2025, the team attempted to contact 101 individuals and successfully made contact with 33. Of those contacted, two (2) agreed to enter treatment immediately. The team also reached out to 11 family members, providing contact information and educational materials.

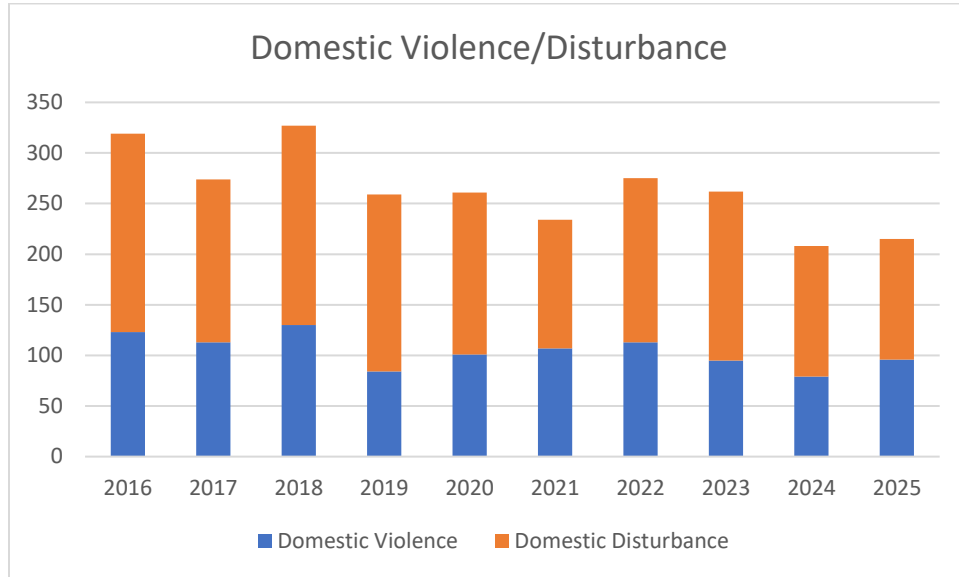
Suicide Calls



In 2025, Troy officers were dispatched to 158 calls classified as suicide or attempted suicide. Dispatchers categorize these incidents into two types: suicide without injury and suicide attempts requiring a squad response. Of the 158 calls, 132 did not require a squad, while 26 involved a squad being dispatched to the scene.

These figures include only calls specifically dispatched as suicide or attempted suicide. Officers also regularly encounter individuals expressing suicidal thoughts during other types of calls, such as welfare checks or following an arrest.

Domestic Violence



In 2025, Troy officers identified 215 disturbance calls involving domestic partners or family members. Of those incidents, 96 were classified as domestic violence cases, which typically result in an arrest. The remaining 119 were categorized as domestic disturbances, defined as incidents involving no threats, attempts, or physical harm to a family or household member.

The following pages are provided as reference materials outlining the number of calls for service and the types of offenses reported to the Troy Police Department in 2025. However, there are important differences between the two reports, which are explained below.

The first report, "Total CAD Calls Received, by Nature of Call," reflects the initial classification of each incident. Every documented incident in our Records Management System (RMS) must include one "Call Nature," and only one can be assigned. This classification is typically entered by a dispatcher based on the information provided by the reporting party. Although an officer may update the call nature in the system, only a single entry is permitted, so it generally reflects either the most serious aspect of the incident or a broad description of the call.

The second report, "Law Incident Reports by Offense Codes," is based on offense codes entered by the reporting officer. Unlike call nature, an incident report may include multiple offense codes, and none are required. This system allows officers to document and track multiple violations or issues within a single incident. For example, if an officer arrests an individual on an outstanding warrant and discovers illegal drugs during a search, the officer would enter two offense codes: one for the warrant and one for drug possession.

It is important to note that the list of "Call Natures" differs from the list of "Offense Codes," as each serves a distinct reporting purpose.
